Around here, trail maintenance means keeping paths clear, accessible, and ready for all who call these trails home. At Foy's to Blacktail Trails, our Program Coordinator, Brian Roland, dedicated his summer to making it happen. It was a big job for one person, but Brian made it look easy! From coordinating partner trail crews to collaborating with land management agencies—and even grabbing a tool himself—Brian kept our trails in top-notch condition. Here's what we (ahem, Brian) managed this season:

Smooth Like Butta: The best trail work is the work you never notice. Finish work includes shaping the backslope to prevent debris from sliding onto the trail, adding a slight outslope to guide water away, removing rocks and roots, packing loose dirt to create a solid trail bed for safe and even travel.

Bye-Bye Brush: Brushy trails and dodging branches is no fun and certainly noticeable on wet days when your pant legs and socks are soaked. Cutting back brush and maintaining a clear, open line of sight allows trail users to see others coming and helps keep everyone safe.

Managing Drainage: Water is a trail's worst enemy, leading to erosion, mud pits, and washouts. While it's not the most glamorous task, building effective drainage is crucial to keeping paths intact and accessible year-round.

THE FINAL TALLY FOR FOY'S TO BLACKTAIL TRAILS

On October 22, 2024 Flathead Valley nonprofits gathered at the Wachholz College Center for the exciting "final reveal" of funds raised during the 2024 Great Fish Community Challenge. It was a record-breaking year, with a staggering \$6,678,402 raised for our community. What a generous show of support by our neighbors!

We are pleased to report that you helped us raise an impressive \$72,487 for our trail system. Your contributions helped us reach our fundraising goal, securing the full \$14,500 match offered to nonprofits that raised over \$25,000. We also took home the Biggest Catch Title on week 2 with an extra \$10,000, plus \$1,000 for outstanding messaging (thanks to Jill for the staff vote!).

A massive thank you goes out to Whitefish Community Foundation and their hard-working staff. These wonderful humans do the heavy lifting during the valley-wide fundraiser and it's a ton of work! Thank you for your energy and smiles, especially on long, hot summer days.

Funds raised for FTBT will go directly into maintaining and enhancing our trail system, ensuring these paths remain safe and welcoming for hikers, bikers, horseback riders, and families.

Our board of directors and staff extend our heartfelt gratitude to every donor and to the Whitefish Community Foundation for their leadership. Here's to many more miles of trails and memories—all made possible by YOU!

- 1. Improved Safety: Rocks, fallen branches, and hidden debris are cleared, reducing slips, trips, and surprises on the trail. And safe trails = more trail fun!
- 2. Better Visibility: With brush trimmed back, you have a clear line of sight, essential for trail runners, bikers, and equestrians to move confidently and to help avoid unexpected encounters.
- 3. Sustainable Paths: Effective, well-placed drainage features prevent water erosion so trails stay intact and ready for use year-round. This also means less maintenance and overall costs when trails are designed with the natural landscape in mind.

4. Enhanced Experience: When trails are clear and well-maintained, it's easier to focus on the scenery and the adventure.

Thanks to support from the FTBT community, we're able to keep this work going strong. Every donation goes right back into keeping these trails in shape for everyone who comes through. So grab your bike, sneakers, dog or horse and go enjoy your local trails!

THANK YOU - Trail work completed in Herron Park and on the FTBT system is accomplished with volunteers, partner groups including Montana Conservation Corps, Flathead Area Mountain Bikers, the Flathead National Forest and Flathead County Recreation Department. 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A huge thank you to everyone who joined us for the 2024 Herron Half, 10K, 5K and Fun Run on June 9th and the Foy's to Blacktail Trails Marathon on September 8th! Both days were filled with energy, community spirit and maybe a little bit of suffering.

The Herron Half saw a fantastic turnout with 236 runners (an increase of 188 participants in 2023) and the FTBT Trail Marathon welcomed 48 runners. Every athlete and race entry fee goes towards trail maintenance and the essential work of Foy's to Blacktail Trails. Thank you for helping us raise over \$14,000 to keep these trails looking good! Congratulations to our top male and female finishers across the race categories!











- Herron Half Marathon: 13.1 miles
- FTBT Marathon: 26.2 miles
- Whitefish Trail Blazer 50K: 31 miles
- Le Griz Ultra-marathon: 50 miles
